

# 700 Years of Philanthropy

EXETER COLLEGE IS BUILT ON PHILANTHROPY. From the early gifts that established the College to the 58% of living alumni who have made a donation 700 years later, generations of Exonians and friends of Exeter have given to ensure that today's students benefit from outstanding teaching, transformative financial aid, and a stimulating academic and social environment.



- 1314: Bishop Walter de Stapeldon makes over the tithes of Gwinear in Cornwall to found Stapeldon Hall, later renamed Exeter College
- 1432: William Palmer, then Rector, gives £100 for the building of Palmer's Tower, four sets of rooms, and lodgings for the Rector
- 1566: Sir William Petre re-endows the College, doubling Exeter's annual income. He also gives Exeter its greatest treasure: the Bohun Psalter



1618: John Peryam, brother of a former Fellow, gives £560 to finance the building of Peryam's Mansions (staircase 4)

1636: Charles I endows Fellowships for scholars from the Channel Islands

1856: The Chapel is completed at a cost of nearly £12,000. Each College Fellow gives a significant percentage of his stipend to the project

1897: The widow of William Morris (1852) donates his copy of the Kelmscott Chaucer, one of the finest pieces of 19th-century book production, to Exeter



1925: Amelia Jackson, widow of Rector William Jackson, leaves her entire estate to the College. Her legacy creates the Amelia Jackson Scholarships and the Staines Medical Research Fellowship, both still in existence today

1964: The Thomas Wood Building (staircases 12, 13 and 14) opens, built thanks to the generosity of Ivan Donald Margary and St Osyth Wood



2012: Sir Ronald Cohen (1964, PPE) makes a gift of £4m towards the purchase and redevelopment of Exeter's 'third quad' and campus on Walton Street; an anonymous alumnus makes a transformational gift towards student support

2013: Gifts from William Jackson (1986, Geography) and Peter Thompson (Friend) endow Exeter's Fellowships in Modern History and English in perpetuity

2014: Exeter enters its eighth century with the highest percentage of alumni giving ever seen outside the USA














# The Tutorial

Exeter is committed to ensuring that this tutorial system is preserved and that those who study at Exeter have access to the most outstanding academics. # Student Support

FINANCIAL SUPPORT ENABLES EXETER to admit the most academically able students, regardless of their personal financial circumstances.

A portfolio of scholarships helps Exeter to attract outstanding graduate students, enhancing the academic depth of the college community. Oxford's undergraduate bursary programme, the most generous in the UK, supports those incoming students who would otherwise be unable to finance their time at Oxford. The cost of providing these bursaries is shared between the central University and the colleges.

Financial support for undergraduates and graduates can significantly reduce the burden of living costs in Oxford and assist with the purchase of essential study materials. It helps graduates to cover the costs associated with attending conferences outside of Oxford, and eliminates the need for undergraduates to take up parttime employment away from their studies, simply to make ends meet. The College also provides a range of grants for sports, music and drama so that all students who wish to participate can do so.

Exeter's academic grant allowed me to travel to Minsk for two weeks. Here I had an opportunity to conduct research in young adult kidney transplantation as well as gain an appreciation of the Belarusian healthcare system. As a thirdyear medical student, this was a chance for me to have first-hand experience in research which is a good foundation for the future. Exeter's financial support was very important as without it I would have struggled to fund the trip."




Exeter is committed to providing facilities that support the 21st century scholar, both on the historic Turl Street site and at its new campus on Walton Street.

Exeter's students live and work in buildings that were not designed for modern study. The beautiful Victorian library needs sympathetic renovation to provide a well furnished and light space in which undergraduates and graduates have easy access to the reference books and journals they need. Further space is also needed within the College for computer facilities, as well as rooms for group study.

The College's vision for the Walton Street campus, just 10 minutes' walk from Turl Street, is to create another quadrangle where space for learning and living is integrated, with undergraduates living and working alongside their tutors. Award-winning architect Alison Brooks has designed a campus in which Oxford's renowned educational system and the 21st century scholar will flourish.





# The Annual Fund





**REGULAR GIFTS PROVIDE A LIFELINE TO** 

THE COLLEGE. We hope that all our alumni will support Exeter each year by making a gift to the Annual Fund. This way of giving, where alumni make monthly or annual donations on a scale that is both sustainable and personally appropriate, provides Exeter with a vital source of dependable income and allows the College to plan ahead and budget appropriately.



Gifts to the Annual Fund are unrestricted, although donors are invited to express a preference for their area of support. Over £650,000 is given to the Annual Fund each year, with 3,300 alumni (some 58% of all living, contactable undergraduates and graduates) having given at some point during the Campaign. Furthermore, we are currently the most widely supported institution outside the USA with a 38% annual giving rate.

This dependable source of regular income allows the College to operate as though it had an additional endowment of £20m. It allows us to fund core initiatives that would otherwise not be possible.

All gifts to the Annual Fund are vital. They are counted towards the Campaign total, and all donors are acknowledged as Campaign donors.

## AREAS SUPPORTED BY THE ANNUAL FUND INCLUDE:

- Exonian Bursaries, which help students in need of financial aid
- The Careers Office, which arranges internships and provides grants allowing students to take up work experience placements
- Sporting and cultural activities of the student body
- The Library
- Most important of all, the tutorial system through funding additional classes and teaching support from graduate students
