



Graduate Scholarships



Your unwavering support is instrumental in enabling Exeter College to champion access and outreach, ensuring an Oxford education is within reach for talented students from all backgrounds. Our aim is to inspire and empower the next generation of Oxford students and to level the educational playing field. We're immensely grateful for your contributions, which allow us to challenge preconceptions, demystify Oxford University, and reach as many students as possible.

This past year has been particularly impactful. We welcomed 51 inbound visits from our link regions and elsewhere, including three overnight residentials where students from five schools immersed themselves in college life. The impact is clear in student feedback: "A really informative visit, meeting students who were clearly passionate about their subjects and their college!"

Our Exeter Plus programme continues to aid students in their transition to university by building study skills. One attendee captured its essence: "Exeter Plus has been a great opportunity to make friends with a small and varied cohort of people, and has made me a lot more confident about my time at Oxford and my degree."

We have also continued the Year 12 strand, supporting disadvantaged young people with their Oxford applications. As one participant noted, after the programme, "The same uniqueness is present from my first impression, but after the sessions the idea that it was inaccessible had vanished." This profound shift in perception is exactly what Exeter Plus aims to achieve.

None of these impactful programmes would be possible without the extraordinary dedication of our Student Ambassadors, Session Leads, Tutors and Donors.

















Exeter College Boat Club

Honouring the Past, Powering the Future

Heritage and continuity matter at Exeter, but change is inevitable. Many will remember the infamous 'death stairs' at the back of the boathouse. In the recent refurbishment, they've been paved over to expand the changing room, offering more privacy and space for a fully kitted-out gym. With artefacts like the HMS Exeter plaque alongside weights and a fleet of ergs, the boathouse finally feels like a space worthy of its history. None of this would've been possible without alumni support.

These donations have made a real impact, helping fund a new set of skinny blades for the women, covering coaching fees (a huge but invaluable investment), and making the stunning refurbishment a reality.

2025 has been monumental: WI earned blades for a third Torpids in a row. OI got Summer VIIIs blades for the first time since 1999, bouncing back from 2024 spoons. W2 brought home the club's first Summer VIIIs blades since 2009. Exeter even made it back to Henley Royal Regatta qualifiers.

It's incredible how many people still feel the pull of ECBC. Thanks to your support, I went from a novice rower to president of the club all in one year. ECBC has left me with much more than a love for rowing and a line on my CV, it has allowed me to become a part of history in the friendliest and most uplifting club I know, and for that, I can't thank you all enough.

For me, I see studying at Oxford as an ideal place to think about and engage with International Relations. I live my degree every single day — in and out of the classroom.

The Holaday Scholarship has made what was once a fantasy my reality. I am incredibly grateful for all the help it has already given me, and I know this and other scholarships will continue to help future generations of students. This scholarship in particular will galvanise year after year of Air Force officers to become more rounded leaders who are able to provide both technical and interpersonal expertise.

Learning is lifelong, whether or not you are attending an institution; Oxford University and Exeter have made me ever more eager to engage in this neverending pursuit.






A Musical Legacy Supporting Exeter's Choral Tradition

"It is no exaggeration to say that choral music both at Exeter and beyond remained critical to Nigel's very being throughout his whole life." During his time at Exeter, Nigel Tonkin (1961, Modern History) was a choral exhibitioner, and he carried that passion for music, singing and playing the organ throughout his life. In fact, when Nigel wrote his will, he included a gift to the College to be used to support the choir – his way of making sure that he could continue to support something that meant so much to him, even when he wouldn't be here to see and hear it.



When Nigel died in 2024 his brother, Tim (1969, Modern Languages), contacted the College to help make sure that Nigel's generous gift would be put to use in the most meaningful way. Following conversations with the Chaplain, it was agreed that Nigel's bequest would be used to purchase a chamber organ for the chapel. Tim felt this was particularly appropriate since Nigel continued to play the organ in his local church until a few months before his death.

Thanks to Nigel's planning and generosity, and Tim's support and encouragement, choral music at Exeter will continue to go from strength to strength.



Stewart-Howerdew Fellowship

A Lasting Legacy for Maths at Exeter

Exeter was privileged to receive a very generous pledge from alumnus David Flowerdew (1996, Mathematics) to endow one of the College's Tutorial Fellowships in Mathematics, currently held by Professor Cornelia Druţu.

The Fellowship will be named the Stewart-Flowerdew Tutorial Fellowship in Mathematics, in honour of David's former tutor, Dr Brian Stewart, who taught at Exeter for over 30 years. This gift is a testament to the transformative power of the tutorial system of teaching, which sets Oxford apart and makes it such a special place to learn and explore. The tutorial method of teaching is expensive, which is why endowment gifts such as this one will help to ensure that Mathematics teaching will continue to be a core subject at Exeter for future generations of students.

The College is profoundly grateful to David and his family for making this commitment. When asked what motivated him to make the gift, David replied, "The exceptional teaching and mentorship provided by Dr Stewart during my time at Exeter left me enjoying maths into my adulthood. I sincerely hope others can find similar enjoyment."
