

Rivka Carmi Graduate Scholarship

Exeter College, Oxford, in conjunction with the Ben-Gurion University Foundation, UK is offering a full scholarship for a student graduating from Ben-Gurion University to undertake a one-year full-time Masters degree at Oxford University, based at Exeter College.

The “Rivka Carmi Scholarship” is tenable from 1 October 2019 for one year, and is worth the Course Fee associated with the course of study (up to a maximum of £26,960 in 2019/2020, for a one-year degree), together with a generous living and travel allowance of £16,224 (free of income tax). The Scholarship is open to any student who:

- is a graduate of Ben-Gurion University of the Negev;
- wishes to study for a one-year, full-time Masters degree at Exeter College, Oxford, and has been accepted into the University of Oxford onto such a graduate course;
- commits to remaining at Exeter College for the duration of his or her course; and
- gives an undertaking (and signs a letter to that effect) to return to Israel on completion of his or her course of study, for a minimum of one year, in order to make a contribution to that country.

How to apply:

1. apply directly to Oxford University (www.ox.ac.uk/graduate) for a place on your chosen 1-year full-time Masters course no later than the [relevant January deadline](#);
2. state Exeter College as your [preferred college](#) on your graduate application form. If Exeter College is not available for your course, make no College preference.
3. Applicants will hear directly from the University if they have been accepted onto their chosen course, usually by the end of April and the successful candidate for the Rivka Carmi Scholarship will be notified by Exeter College that they have been awarded the Scholarship, normally by the end of May;
4. All eligible applicants who are in receipt of an offer from the University for their chosen course will automatically be considered for the Rivka Carmi Scholarship: no further application is required;
5. The leading candidate will be invited to an interview with President Carmi at Ben Gurion University.
